The National Annual ENA Conference will be held September 20-24 in Tampa, Florida. The first 2 days are the General Assembly meeting with delegates from all 50 states holding discussions and voting on proposed

changes to the Bylaws and Procedures of our organization. There are 22 Resolutions that have been authored by members of other State Council's for the membership to discuss and vote on. Many of these Resolutions pertain to your nursing practice and the safety and quality of care. Deb Wodarek (State Council Secretary and Triage Editor) and I authored a Resolution to require National ENA to maintain a Repository of injury prevention programs and resources under the Injury Prevention arm of IQSIP. (Institute of Quality, Safety and Injury Prevention). The Resolution is attached to this newsletter to share with you so you get a sense of the delegation's work and purpose to support ENA members. Some of the history behind this resolution is the dissolving of the ENCARE Programs that were popular for ER nurses to give in schools and communities. You may remember some of them on Dare to Care, Gun Safety, and Alcohol Awareness, and so on. Since there was a shift in healthcare to safety and quality, ENA followed, and these programs are no longer available. We felt as patient advocates, that ER and trauma nursing personnel in all settings, should be the leaders in injury prevention programs. This Resolution has caused a stir since it's beginning at Leadership in February and thus the repository has been growing since but we are going to continue and bring it to the delegation. I encourage everyone to make plans to attend a National ENA conference to learn and network with 2,000+ nurses who take care of the same patients as you do and have the same difficulties. It is very refreshing to be a part of the conference.

Safety Notes

Once again we have survived the prom-graduation-open house- July 4th season, and need to keep on going

for the Labor Day, new school year, homecoming, Halloween, Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Years seasons!

According to the Michigan Office of Highway Safety this

July 4th holiday Michigan law enforcement officers made more than 6,050 traffic stops and arrested 218 drunk drivers - 41 of them for having a blood alcohol content of .17 or higher - during the July 4th *Drunk Driving. Over the Limit.*

Under Arrest. crackdown. In addition, 49 motorists were arrested for drug-related offenses, more than twice as many as during last year's July 4th enforcement effort.

Officers in 35 counties took part in the July 1-10 crackdown which was coordinated by the Michigan Office of Highway

Safety Planning (OHSP) and funded by federal traffic safety dollars. This year's crackdown included 15 recently trained Drug Recognition Expert (DRE) officers. DREs are trained to recognize signs of impairment in drivers under the influence of drugs other than, or in addition to, alcohol.

"Enforcement efforts like the *Over the Limit. Under Arrest.* crackdown help make our communities safer,"

said OHSP Director Michael L. Prince. "Removing impaired drivers from the roadways saves lives. It's that simple."

Grant-funded patrols resulted in the apprehension of 116 fugitives and 19 felony arrests. More than 160 seat belt and child seat violation tickets, 676 speeding tickets and 950 other traffic violation citations were also written.

Preliminary reports indicate nine people were killed in nine

separate crashes during this year's holiday weekend with four of the crashes involving alcohol.

A second *Over the Limit. Under Arrest.* drunk driving crackdown kicks off Aug. 19 with law enforcement agencies in 35 counties conducting impaired driving enforcement through the Labor Day weekend.

As Emergency nurses the holidays are especially busy and stressful as we take care of the public's mishaps. One of the important things not to forget is to take care of ourselves. Make sure you take the time for a snack, a glass of water, or just a few seconds of peace and quiet. Make sure that you compliment your co-workers on a job well done, increased job satisfaction decreases on the job accidents. Take of yourself and each other so you can continue to keep others safe.

Resolution Title: Repository for Injury Prevention Programs under ENA IQSIP

- 1 Whereas, ENA has been the leader in injury prevention for the community through (ENCARE)⁵
2 Emergency Nurses Cancel Alcohol Related Emergencies programs; and

- 4 Whereas, The ENA Association has been recognized as a leader by other organizations through
5 their injury prevention programs; and

- 7 Where as, since ENCARE⁵ has been dissolved there is limited availability of community prevention
8 programs; and

- 10 Whereas, In 2007, 18,000 people were victims of homicide and more than 34,000 took their own life;

- 13 Whereas, According to National Highway Traffics Safety Administration (NHTSA)⁶ an additional
14 17,402 lives could have been saved with seat belt use; and
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- 16 Whereas, An estimated 2.3 million crash-related injuries among adults were treated in emergency
17 departments in 2009; CDC² and

- 19 Whereas, In 2008, 1368 ENCARE programs were presented by emergency nurses across the
20 country; with 14 states reporting 802 ENCARE programs and 253 Non-ENCARE programs
21 with 79,897 participants, and 11 states reported 313 outreach programs (ENA 2011)⁴; and

- 23 Whereas, No statistics are being collected at this time. Statistics will drive funding/grants for further
24 development of injury prevention programs for the emergency nurse to present to the
25 community; and
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- 27 Whereas, The FY 2012 President's Budget request includes \$167.5 million for injury prevention
28 (CDC)¹; and, therefore, be it
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- 30 *Resolved,* The ENA General Assembly requests that the ENA staff create links under IQSIP as a

Resolution Title: Repository for Injury Prevention Programs under ENA IQSIP

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Resolution Background Information:

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ENCARE began in 1981 by Barbara Foley, RN and Pam Bell, RN after a horrible weekend in their Massachusetts emergency department of injuries due to drinking and driving. What started as an Alcohol Awareness program for teens expanded into public health issues such as safe medication use, fall prevention, safe mobility, safe driving decisions and pedestrian safety among older adults. It was a National organization of Injury Prevention Providers and Instructors who worked to decrease unintentional injuries across the entire age spectrum. (Manasotena, com)⁵ In 2001 it became the ENA Injury Prevention Institute which was an affiliation of ENCARE and ENA. This affiliation benefited both organizations with a "collaborative effort to promote injury prevention and healthy lifestyles". Programs were developed for Bike and Helmet Safety and Gun Safety. Emergency Nurses who were active in teaching these programs became involved in advocacy at the local, state and National levels. In 2011 the Injury Prevention arm of ENA was placed under the new Institute of Quality, Safety and Injury Prevention. ENCARE programs are no longer available for emergency nurses to purchase. No statistics of injury prevention programs given to the public are collected for possible grant and funding.

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According to the 2008 ENA Position Statement on Motor Vehicle Safety as adopted by the 2008 Board of Directors:

ENA supports the following interventions to promote motor vehicle-related safety:

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1. Education /Initiatives for Behavior Change

- School-based educational programs such as Choices for Living, Students against Destructive Decisions (SADD), Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD), etc.
- School-based pedestrian and bike safety education programs and a host of other programs.

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A 2008 National Survey of the Use of Booster Seats (nationwide child restraint survey conducted by NHTSA) found that "Reducing health disparities by assuring equal access to preventive services for families whose children are at higher risk for injury (e.g., eliminating the financial barriers to attaining child safety seats and increasing educational efforts of correctly installed and fitted child safety seats) could help reduce the \$3.6 billion annual bill for injuries to children". (ENA Scorecard 2010)³

Data from child seat checkup stations consistently show that four out of five participants unintentionally made potentially hazardous installation mistakes, because child restraint systems are known to be complicated to install due to factors such as confusing child seat design, vehicle design and instructions (ENA Scorecard 2010)³

- 20 percent of injury crashes in 2009 involved reports of distracted driving. (NHTSA)⁶.
- Of those killed in distracted-driving-related crashes, 995 involved reports of a cell phone as a distraction (18% of fatalities in distraction-related crashes). (NHTSA)

- 83 •In 2009, 5,474 people were killed in U.S. roadways and an estimated additional 448,000 were
84 injured in motor vehicle crashes that were reported to have involved distracted driving.
85 ((NHTSA)⁶
- 86 •The age group with the greatest proportion of distracted drivers was the under-20 age group – 16
87 percent of all drivers younger than 20 involved in fatal crashes were reported to have been
88 distracted while driving. (NHTSA)
- 89 •Each year, 1,700 college students die and more than 1.4 million are injured in alcohol-related
90 incidents. Results of a Pacific Institute for Research (PIRE) study published in December 2010
91 of the *American Journal of Preventive Medicine* indicated that a community-wide prevention
92 strategy was effective in decreasing drinking to intoxication.(CDC Injury Center Connection
93 Winter 2011)¹

94 In 1992, the CDC established the National Center for Injury Prevention and Control (NCIPC) as the lead
95 Federal organization to prevent violence. They are working to create and evaluating programs to prevent
96 violence. They believe injuries can be prevented by primary prevention of education and intervention.

97 There is an increasing body of evidence on strategies and interventions to be used to prevent unintentional
98 injuries in child and young adults. (Irving, 2011)⁷

99 There are many resources and programs available for public education targeted to all age groups.
100 Emergency nurses are advocates for injury prevention and have looked to ENA as a leader in providing the
101 tools to use for educating the public on the dangers of drinking and driving, risky behaviors, medication
102 safety, gun safety, and a host of other topics. ENA needs to offer a repository of programs, internet links,
103 and resources for emergency nurses that are evidenced based that are to be used to continue to advocate
104 for safe practices and injury prevention efforts in the community. ENA will continue to have increased
105 visibility in the community as a leader in injury prevention education that will be provided by ENA members.

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107 **Relationship to ENA Philosophy and Bylaws:**

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109 The mission of the ENA is to "advocate for patient safety and excellence in emergency nursing practice."

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111 This resolution serves ENA's mission by:

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- Promoting the interest of ENA's members and by improving the professional environment of the emergency nurse through education and public awareness.

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- Identifying and disseminating key trends affecting and pertinent to emergency nursing.

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- Assisting nurses to serve as an advocate for the public regarding emergency care through injury prevention education.

Resolution Title: Repository for Injury Prevention Programs under ENA IQSIP

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Financial Considerations:

The investigation of Evidence Based Practice Injury Prevention programs, the exploration of educational requirements for the emergency nurse to delivery these community educational programs; and the posting and maintenance of Website content would require a 20% FTE ENA staff at the injury prevention senior associate level for content expertise.

Data collection for the number of community education programs presented would be a 20% FTE ENA staff at the administrative level with data entry skills.

Data cleaning/analysis/interpretation/reporting would require 30% FTE ENA staff.

Resolution Outcome:

That ENA will create links under IQSIP as a repository for injury prevention programs and education that are evidence based. There will be with a sub-tool bar page for hyperlinks for injury prevention education under IQSIP that are also evidence based. ENA will explore the education requirements for the emergency nurse to deliver these community educational programs and collect statistics that will measure emergency nurse's community involvement through injury prevention program presentations.
