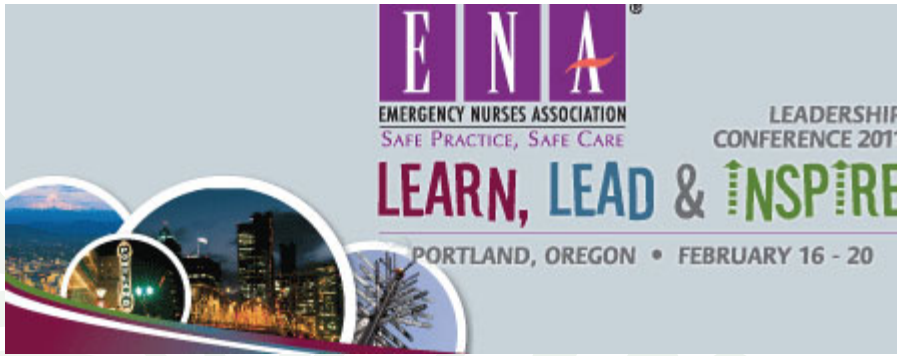

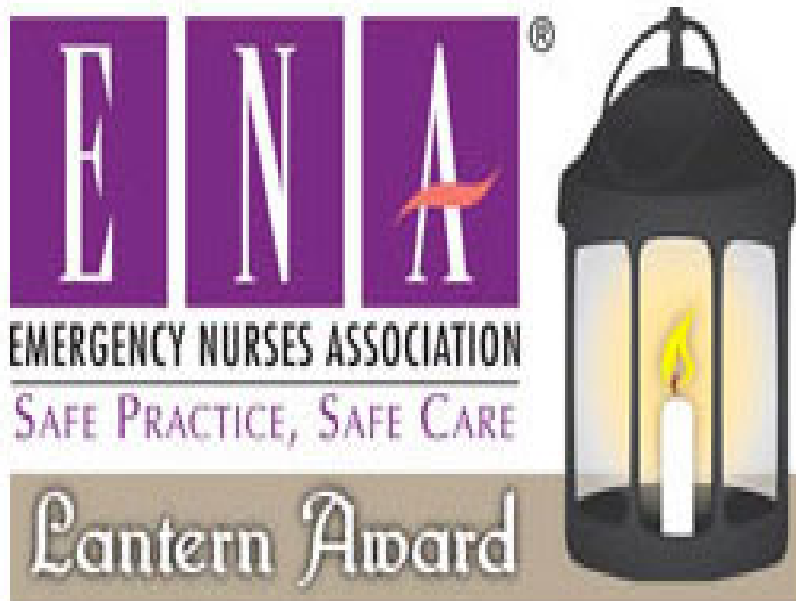

The Emergency Nurses Association is issuing a call for nominations for the 2011 ENA National Awards. This is the opportunity to recognize innovators, leaders, and those who continually go above and beyond the call of duty in the emergency nursing profession.

For most awards, only an ENA member can submit a nomination, and the award nominee must be an ENA member. Information on submitting nominations, a 2011 application, the specific requirements for each award, and tips on how to write letters of support and submit a nomination can be found on this ENA Web site. Open the judges' sample score sheets to help prepare your packets.

Nominations packets must be received no later than May 2, 2011. The awards will be presented during the 2011 Annual Conference in Tampa, Florida, September 20-24, 2011.

AWARD CATEGORIES

Barbara A. Foley Injury Prevention Leadership Award

This award honors an active injury prevention advocate, who, within the past year, has served as a leader in the development and promotion of injury prevention programs at the national, state, or local level.

Behind the Scenes Award

This award recognizes individuals who have made significant contributions, behind the scenes, to promote ENA's mission through their support of a member or members. This award will recognize an ENA advocate who is often seen but not heard and who donates countless hours to assist an ENA member or members in achieving state, local or national goals. ENA membership is not required.

Frank L. Cole Nurse Practitioner Award

This award recognizes excellence as a nurse practitioner (NP) in an emergency care setting. Recipients will be recognized by their NP peers, nursing and physician colleagues, and patients as clinical experts who deliver compassionate care in an emergency setting. Recipients will be actively involved in promoting the role and strengthening the image of nurses and NPs, especially those in emergency care settings.

Judith C. Kelleher Award

Named after ENA's co-founder, this award honors a member of the Association who has consistently demonstrated excellence in emergency nursing and has made significant contributions to the profession of nursing, the specialty of emergency nursing, and the Emergency Nurses Association. Nominations for this award must include three letters of support from different states. This award is presented at the Anita Dorr Memorial Luncheon during the Annual Conference.

Lifetime Achievement Award

This is an individual award and reflects a career of dedicated service, accomplishments and/or contributions to emergency nursing. The special significance of the Lifetime Achievement Award is the enduring nature of the achievements, and that the accomplishments and/or contributions have value to emergency nursing beyond the recipient's lifetime. Nominations for this award must include three letters of support from different states.

Media Award

This award recognizes a media presentation (television, radio, internet, or print) that portrays emergency nursing in a positive, accurate, and professional manner. This presentation may have been created primarily to educate the consumer about emergency nursing or emergency care issues or it may have been developed for other purposes. ENA membership and submission of a CV are not required. A copy of the media presentation must be submitted with the nomination.

Nurse Manager Award

This award honors a nurse who has consistently demonstrated excellence in the profession of emergency nursing and made significant contributions through an emergency nursing management role. At least one letter of support must be from a person or persons the manager supervises.

Nursing Competence in Aging Award

The Nursing Competence in Aging Award recognizes a member who has demonstrated outstanding commitment to care for older adults and the geriatric community.

Nursing Education Award

This award honors a nurse who has made significant contributions to the education of colleagues, nursing students, EMS personnel, patients, families or the community through the publication of articles, formal or informal courses, or the development of a specific emergency nursing program or curriculum.

Nursing Practice Award

This award honors a nurse who exemplifies outstanding nursing practice as demonstrated through clinical skills, care and compassion. This nurse consistently performs above and beyond the requirements of the job description in delivering quality care to patients, and participates in nursing programs, committees, or projects contributing to emergency nursing practice.

Nursing Professionalism Award

This award honors an emergency nurse who is recognized by peers as an expert in emergency nursing and who consistently exhibits traits associated with professional behavior and commitment to professional values. The recipient must be active within the profession and influences emergency nursing through interaction with other professionals, the media or the public.

Nursing Research Award

This award honors a nurse who has made significant contributions to the profession by conducting and/or utilizing research and disseminating research findings.

Quality and Safety Award

This award is presented to an individual or an emergency department for activities that advance quality and safety resulting in improved outcomes. The recipient must have developed and implemented innovative quality and safety initiatives in the emergency department setting.

Rising Star Award

This award recognizes a new ENA member (membership for less than 5 years) who has made significant contributions to ENA as exhibited by involvement at both the state and national levels, while working to enhance ENA as the professional organization of emergency nurses. One of the letters of support must be from the nominee's State or Chapter President.

State Council/Chapter Government Affairs Award

This award honors an ENA State Council or Chapter for outstanding efforts to increase member involvement in government affairs and advance public policy in support of nursing, health care, or injury prevention issues. The CV of the Chapter or State President or Government Affairs Chairperson must be submitted.

TEAM AWARD

THIS AWARD RECOGNIZES A GROUP OR COMMITTEE (TWO OR MORE PERSONS) FOR SIGNIFICANT CONTRIBUTION TOWARDS ACHIEVING THE MISSION OF ENA THROUGH A PROJECT OR DEVELOPMENT OF A PROGRAM. THE PROGRAM OR PROJECT MUST HAVE HAD A POSITIVE IMPACT ON THE PROFESSION WITHIN THE COMMUNITY, REGION, OR COUNTRY. ENA MEMBERSHIP IS REQUIRED FOR AT LEAST ONE TEAM MEMBER AND THE CV OF THE TEAM LEADER MUST BE SUBMITTED.

Updated Guidelines Support Expansion of Ketamine Use in ED Setting

January 20, 2011 — Guidelines for use of ketamine in emergency department (ED) procedural sedation have been updated for the first time since 2004; the use of ketamine has been expanded to include adults and babies between 3 and 12 months of age, according to a new report.

The updated guidelines were [published online](#) January 20 in the *Annals of Emergency Medicine*.

Accompanying the guidelines was a [report conveying](#) the results of the first randomized, controlled trial of ketamine plus propofol vs propofol alone in the ED setting. Study authors Henry David, MD, and Joseph Shipp, PAC, from the Department of Emergency Medicine at the University of Missouri-Columbia found that the use of ketamine plus propofol improved outcomes compared with ketamine alone.

The randomized trial included healthy children and adults undergoing procedural sedation who were pretreated with intravenous fentanyl and then randomly assigned to receive intravenous ketamine, 0.5 mg/kg (n = 97), or placebo (n = 96). Both groups then immediately received intravenous propofol, 1 mg/kg, with additional doses of 0.5 mg/kg given as needed to achieve and maintain sedation.

The trial found that the incidence of respiratory depression was similar in the ketamine/propofol group (22%) and the propofol-alone group (28%). In addition, compared with propofol alone, for the group receiving ketamine/propofol, clinicians were more satisfied, less propofol was administered, and there appeared to be a trend toward better sedation quality.

"Addition of a subdissociative dose of ketamine to propofol did not significantly reduce respiratory depression," the authors conclude. "However, it did result in greater provider satisfaction, a decreased propofol requirement, and a trend toward more effective sedation."

According to the researchers, the "most striking" outcome was markedly greater provider satisfaction with ketamine/propofol. "This did not correlate with sedation scores and thus reflects features of sedation that transcend simple sedation depth," they suggest. "Possibilities include the more consistent sedation already described or the decreased need to titrate additional propofol."

Regarding the new guidelines, lead author of the guidelines, Steven M. Green, MD, from the Department of Emergency Medicine at Loma Linda University, California, noted, "It was time to update the clinical guidelines because substantial new research on the use of ketamine warranted it."

Since the guidelines were last updated, there has been "sufficient emergency department research in adults to support expansion of ketamine use beyond children," Dr. Green noted in a news release. He added that the body of research now supports the expansion of ketamine for use in children younger than previously recommended (ie, between 3 and 12 months of age). "We further recommend that emergency physicians administer ketamine intravenously instead of intra-muscularly whenever feasible, and that certain other medications not be routinely co-administered," he added.

The guidelines and report were not commercially funded. Dr. Green, Dr. David, and Joseph Shipp have disclosed no relevant financial relationships.

TNCC & ENPC REPORT

COURSE DIRECTORS MAY WANT TO AVOID OFFERING ENPC COURSES DURING THIS TIME. ENPC INSTRUCTORS WILL BE UPDATED USING THE ONLINE ENA LMS SYSTEM, NO LIVE UPDATES WILL BE OFFERED. THE WRITTEN EXAM QUESTIONS WERE 'TESTED' IN SAN ANTONIO USING SELECTED CURRENT INSTRUCTORS AND THE TEST WILL AGAIN BE 'TESTED' IN PORTLAND, OR AT THE LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE. TRIAGE WILL NOT BE A TESTED STATION, BUT CONTENT WILL BE INCORPORATED INTO THE WRITTEN EXAM. UPDATED SCENARIOS WILL BE PROVIDED FOR THE ILL AND INJURED CHILD STATION. CLINICAL INTERVENTIONS WILL NOT BE A JEOPARDY GAME. CHECK THE ENA WEBSITE, ENA.ORG UNDER COURSES TO READ COURSEBYTES FOR MORE DETAILS.

THE TRAUMA NURSE CORE COURSE 6TH EDITION REVISION IS SCHEDULED FOR 2012.

THE COURSE IN ADVANCED TRAUMA NURSING II (CATN) IS BEING REVISED BEGINNING IN 2011. CATN CE AND BOOKS WILL NOT BE AVAILABLE AFTER APRIL 30, 2011. ENA WILL NOT APPROVE ANY CATN II COURSES SCHEDULED AFTER MAY 1, 2011.

COURSE FEES HAVE RISEN FOR THE FIRST TIME IN 12 YEARS. AFTER JANUARY 1, 2011, THE ENA ADMINISTRATIVE FEE WILL BE INCREASED \$5.00 TO \$65.00 PER STUDENT. THE 10% DISCOUNT FOR PREPAYING ADMINISTRATIVE FEES IS STILL AVAILABLE.

NEW GUIDELINES WILL BEGIN JANUARY 1, 2011 FOR PRETESTING OF INSTRUCTOR CANDIDATES. IF THE CANDIDATE HAS SUCCESSFULLY PASSED A PROVIDER COURSE WITH 90% WITHIN THE LAST 90 DAYS PRIOR TO THE INSTRUCTOR COURSE, NO FURTHER PRETESTING IS NECESSARY. FOR THOSE WHO DO NEED TO PRETEST, PRETESTING SHOULD OCCUR WITHIN TWO WEEKS OF THE COURSE, BY EITHER THE COURSE DIRECTOR OR DESIGNEE. ENA HAS OFFICIALLY STATED THAT INSTRUCTOR CANDIDATES SHOULD TEACH TWO COURSES BEFORE DIRECTING AND THAT NEW DIRECTORS MUST BE MONITORED BY AN EXPERIENCED DIRECTOR FOR THEIR FIRST COURSE.

INJURY PREVENTION

Hello everyone, I was just surfing the AAA website and found lots of interesting things. There is a Newsroom Tab that has videos for all kinds of safety subjects. There is a Products Tab where you can order a bunch of brochures for free. Free is always helpful! There is a spot on the home page in the lower left corner where they have archived all of their videos, and you can use them!

According to the AAA Foundation, last year 10,839 people died in car crashes in which at least one driver had a non-zero BAC, That is nearly one-third of all road deaths. Also, nearly 70% of these deaths involve a driver with a very high BAC (.15+) and/or a driver whose BAC was over the legal limit of 0.08 who also had previous DUI within three years prior to the crash. This is craziness and needs to stop!

About 87% agree that people driving after drinking alcohol are a very serious threat to their personal

safety, and even more (93%) consider it to be completely unacceptable for a driver to drive when they may have drank too much. More than four out of five people say that they would lose respect for a friend if they found out that they had driven after drinking too much. So why do we let them get behind the wheel? We need to be held accountable. If we are going out with people that have drunk too much, isn't it our responsibility to take their keys away? Remember, "Friends don't let friends drive drunk."

Nine out of ten people support requiring all drivers who have been convicted of DWI more than once to use an alcohol-ignition interlock system. This is a device that prevents the driver from starting the car if his or her breath contains measurable alcohol in their cars. Good plan for many!

Motor vehicle crashes remain the

leading cause of death for all people ages 1-34, and many of these deaths involve impaired driving.

Last New Year's Day (2009), an average of 80 people were killed in alcohol-related crashes.

I heard on the radio this morning that the NRA is going to sponsor education for our school children on Gun Safety. This may be an avenue for support of our programs. They may reimburse us or give us some grant money to educate our kids. One idea is to send a letter to area grade schools (or middle or high schools) and let know that we have a program already put together and we can provide this service.

Let's utilize the resources around us. Let's share the web-sites and videos, and let's see if we can't turn this around and make our Nation safer.

GOVERNMENT AFFAIRS

Happy New Year! We start the New Year with new people in the Legislator in Lansing and in the Congress in Washington. Many nurses, even emergency nurses, wonder what that has to do with them and their practice. So I'm encouraging you to attend the Michigan Nurses Association "Nurses March" on March 30, 2011 in Lansing. There you will hear speakers discussing some of the current issues that affect our practice and have the opportunity to visit with Legislators or their aides in their offices to discuss your concerns about your patients in your emergency department, your hospital, and your nursing practice. We, as emergency nurses, have some serious issues now, which need addressing at the state and national level, with the care of psychiatric patients, over-crowding in our emergency departments and nursing shortages (or

hiring freezes). How is your EMS system and your trauma system doing? Is this one of your concerns? This is a perfect time to talk to lawmakers. And earn some continuing education credits. Watch for additional news on the MNA webpage, on the events calendar.

One of my goals for the year is to have some of you, ideally one or two nurses from each chapter, attend the March. I would also like to hear back from whom ever attends and what they learned. There will be a lot of energy there, along with student nurses where much of the energy is generated by, but also many staff nurses to meet and network with.

I would also like one contact person in each chapter to share government affairs concerns, news and what is being done on the political front by the nurses there to volunteer. Your voice does count, we

are the experts in emergency nursing, and the people that have been elected do consider what we say.
